The John Murray Lecture will now be delivered by the Rev Dr Douglas F. Kelly, Professor of Systematic Theology in Reformed Theological Seminary in Charlotte, North Carolina. Dr Kelly is a Trustee of HTC. His lecture will be given at 7pm on Wednesday 14th December and the subject is 'Triumphant Christ in Today's World'.

Both lectures will be given in Castle Street Church of Scotland in Dingwall, close to the College.

Ministry degree were Klaus Buwert, Jeff Lowman and Jim Thompson. We have had several Church of Scotland Ministers among our

Doctor of Ministry graduates and this year was no exception. Klaus is a Church of Scotland Minister in Wishaw and his dissertation was an assessment of the home mission strategy of the Church of Scotland. Jeff Lowman completed his work in the USA, having completed his earlier modules at HTC. Jim Thompson carried out an assessment of twenty five years of preparing young people for church membership in his congregation in Northern Ireland.

Two of our American postgraduate students completed their work and graduated this year. Clay Quarterman, working in theological education in Ukraine with Mission to the World (the mission arm of the Presbyterian Church in America) completed his PhD on Presbyterian missiology. Clay grew up in 1st Presbyterian Church, Jackson, Mississippi, where his father is an elder. Brad Mercer, who coincidentally is one of the associate ministers at 1st Presbyterian Church, Jackson, completed his M.Phil degree, focussing on the theology of C.S. Lewis.

# **Evangelical Theological Society**

There will be about 7,000 people attending these three conferences.

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# **Mission Visits**

HTC regularly receives visits from the general secretaries of various missionary societies, often accompanied by missionaries home on furlough. We regard this as an important opportunity for our students to hear about what God is doing in different parts of the world and to test if God's call on their lives might be to work overseas. Our Missions Co-ordinator and Bursar, Sandra Macdonald, herself a missionary in Thailand for almost quarter of a century, organises these visits. Already this academic year we have had visits from Simeon Ewing, talking about work in Ukraine; Phil Steed of OMF describing a visit to Japan, Mainland China & Macao; and Will Niven of ECM, speaking about an Albanian Church Planting Apprenticeship. Coming soon is Shirley Fraser of Friends International, speaking about the work they do with international students. In the New Year, representatives from Wycliffe and Leprosy Mission will be visiting.

## **Conference Facilities**

We have an excellent conference room in the College and are able to provide all that is required for various types of meetings, including power point projection, video-conference facilities, and so on. We can also arrange meals through arrangements with various catering companies. Many groups now use this facility. It has been used by the board of Ross & Cromarty Enterprise, by BP, by the Health Board, the Education Department, by SEPA and many others. If you need somewhere to hold a meeting, please consider hiring HTC.

# **Learning Centre**

As part of UHI, we want to provide a service to our community and so, in our Learning Centre, we are offering many different courses. There are courses in computing, in languages, in digital photography, in website design, in sign language for the deaf and much more. It is even possible to do a degree course through UHI. We have students who, by video-conference, are taking degrees in Gaelic, in Rural Development and in Culture **Studies** (including history and archaeology). # **Open Learning**

There are many people who would like to study theology but for financial or work or family reasons cannot move to Dingwall for three or four years. The good news is that you can study for your BA in Theology wherever you are. It can be done by traditional learning packs posted to your door, or by web-based materials which are already available. In fact, if you live within reach

of one of the 14 Colleges of UHI, you can come into the classroom by video-conference! Don't let distance stop you becoming a student.

# **New Library**

The HTC library is now the largest of all the Colleges in UHI and growing fast. We currently have over 45,000 volumes. We have plans to reconstruct the ground floor of our rear building into a large open plan library and to convert the 'bothy' (a building in the car park) into a dedicated student centre. This project will cost £175,000. Fraser Jackson, our IT Technician and Library Cataloguer, has created a virtual tour of what this new library will look like. This project will take place in a couple of years' time when we have raised the money.

## Profile - Rev Donald MacIver, BA MA



The Rev Donald MacIver is the course leader for our Access to Theology course, which is running in full-time mode as well as open learning this session. Donald is the minister at Fearn Free

Church of Scotland and is married to Isabelle and have three children. Donald, who is originally from the Isle of Lewis, was minister at the Free Church of Scotland in Cumbernauld. He was Principal at Dumisani Theological Institute and Bible School in South Africa, where our colleague the Rev Dr Alistair Wilson has now followed in his footsteps, to take up the Prinicpal's role there.

# **Doctor of Ministry**

The Doctor of Ministry course has proved to be popular with students from the UK and from the USA. It is designed for ministers who already have at least three years of experience and it is very practically based. It is taught on a modular basis. For each course, Ministers read six or seven books over a period of months, then they come to HTC for one week of teaching, seminars and so on. Finally they write a 25 page essay. The students take eight such courses (for three of which they go to the USA) then they write a 30,000 word dissertation.

The next course is to be taught by the Rev Dominic Smart in January 2006 and is entitled 'Communicating in a Postmodern World'. Then, in August 2006, the Rev Eric Alexander will teach a course on 'Expository Preaching' (one of our most popular courses) and then, also in August 2006, Dr Allen Curry from Reformed Theological Seminary will teach a course entitled 'Theology of Ministry'. # The Church of Scotland

On Friday 11<sup>th</sup> November, a group from the Church of Scotland Council of Ministries visited HTC. This visit followed a decision at the General Assembly of the Church of Scotland back in May, to consider whether HTC meets the criteria to be recognised as a place of education and training for the Church. If successful, this will mean that prospective Church of Scotland ministers could come to HTC. At the moment, candidates must go to one of the universities of Glasgow, Edinburgh, St Andrews and Aberdeen.

There were eight members of the group which came from the Church of Scotland, chaired by the Rev Douglas Cranston, Convener of the Council of Ministries. The HTC team consisted of Andrew McGowan, HTC Principal, Hector Morrison, the Vice Principal, Professor Bob Cormack, Principal of UHI and John Farquhar Munro, our MSP.

It is anticipated that, before the end of the year, HTC will be told what recommendation is going to the General Assembly of 2006.

# Have you ever thought you would like to know more about the Bible or the Christian faith?

# **Your Support Needed**

It is a simple fact that we are able to do all that is described in this Newsletter only as long we have your ongoing help and support. Income from student fees certainly plays a big part but, as we explained in the last Newsletter, we do need the sustained and sustaining help of our Christian friends and supporters if we are to cover all our costs and commitments.

Please consider making a donation to the work of the college right now. You can also increase your giving even further by completing a Gift Aid Declaration, if you are a tax payer. During the last few years, the College has benefited greatly from donations made under the Gift Aid scheme. In the Academic Session 2004/05, about £23,600 was given under Gift Aid/Deed of Covenant. This allowed the College to reclaim over £6,600 From Inland Revenue. Since the start of April of this year, thanks to continuing support and a number of new donors, gifts have been received totalling over £12,000 making possible a recovery of nearly £3,500 to date.

Giving through our Gift Aid scheme brings two great benefits to the college itself. First, periodic giving (normally by standing order) provides the College with the knowledge and assurance of income and support on a regular basis. It may be monthly, quarterly or at some other frequency. The significant thing is that it is predictable, known in advance. This brings us much greater certainty in our cashflow and expenditure planning. Second, where you, as a donor, pay income tax and have provided a Gift Aid Declaration to the college, it permits the College

to recover tax on all direct gifts you make (other than gifts previously made by Deed of Covenant), including those you may have made some time ago, right back to 6<sup>th</sup> April 2000!

We are most thankful for all your support, both past and present, and we actively encourage you to increase your giving by returning a Gift Aid Declaration form to us, if you have not already done so. If you do not find one with this newsletter, please contact us and we will send one to you.

For all those who so faithfully support us on a regular basis or from time to time, please do review the support you provide, with a view to increasing it for the year ahead.

Would you consider giving to HTC through your will? Last year we received a wonderful legacy which made a very significant difference to our ability to deliver our courses and to fulfil our mission.
