Miss Marion Graham

The HTC community were deeply saddened by the death recently of a dear friend and supporter, Miss Marion Graham.

Marion spent almost all of her working life at the John Tallach Secondary School in Ingwenya, Zimbabwe, as a teacher and for many years as head teacher. Under her guidance, the school achieved a very high standard of education, equipping many able graduates to play a significant part in the development of that country. But it was not only a solid educational grounding that the children received — all was permeated with a clear and careful presentation of the Gospel message. Marion's concern for the spiritual welfare of her charges was obvious to all and her prayerful interest in her former pupils never wavered. The deep affection and esteem in which she was held continued long after she had returned to her native Scotland.

Not long after her retirement to her beloved Highlands, Marion offered to help as a volunteer at Highland Theological College where she proved to be a kind and wise friend to all. Her cheerful presence enhanced the reception area of the College where she endeared herself to staff, students and visitors alike. Her willingness to take on any task was a great boon and it wasn't long before her exceptional educational gifts were put to very good use in the support of open learning Access students in the crucial study skills module.

We feel her loss deeply but we rejoice that she is now beyond all pain and grief in the joyful presence of her Lord and Saviour whom she served so faithfully all these years. Our deepest sympathy is extended to her sister Jane and her twin brother Sinclair and the family. 
UHI Millennium Institute

Following the article in the previous HTC Newsletter, we are pleased to confirm the Privy Council's decision that UHI Millennium Institute be granted its own taught degree awarding powers. This is a huge achievement for UHI and a pre-requisite step on the progress towards university title. These are exciting times for everybody involved with UHI, and with HTC which is a key college in the partnership. More than 6800 students are currently studying at university-level with UHI through its network of colleges, research institutions and learning centres in the Highlands and Islands.



Induction of Peter Mackenzie

The induction of Peter Mackenzie took place in June in Bulkington Congregational Church and was conducted by the Rev Neville Swain with the Rev Hector Morrison, HTC vice-principal, preaching at the service.

Bulkington, a village of about 9000 souls, is located in Warwickshire between Nuneaton and Coventry. The Congregational Church is affiliated to the Evangelical Fellowship of Congregational Churches. The congregation had been without a Pastor for about three years, but the period of the vacancy was an opportunity for the people to grow in love one for the other. About 35 attend on a typical Sunday morning and 30 on Sunday evening. Recent weeks have brought encouraging signs of increased attendance and three people have sought church membership.

Peter began studying with HTC on the Access Course then progressed to the BA programme, beginning his degree studies as an open-learning student whilst still in full-time employment. He then gave up his work in the civil service and moved to Dingwall to become a full-time student for the remainder of his studies. Peter graduates from HTC in October with a BA Honours degree in Theological Studies.

Malawi

Several of the Scottish churches have strong links with Malawi and it was great to hear news from Shirley Riddell, HTC graduate, of a recent visit she made to Ekwendeni Mission Station. Shirley said:

'On arrival at Lilongwe we received a very warm welcome from deeply committed Christian friends. Not a sign of a polite, reserved handshake - we were part of whosever family we happened to be with at any time. During our ten days we visited every department at the hospital and probably all of the schools as well as a variety of clinics out in the bush. Daily work at the hospital commenced with prayers at 7.10am and every meeting or journey was prayed for. In fact prayer and worship is as obvious and necessary as breathing. Participation in Sunday worship with the Pastors and Elders at Ekwendeni Church was entirely joyful and a great blessing. Open air Communion on a Malawian hill with hundreds of people was wonderful!'

Links between Malawi and UHI have also been strengthening. Last year Evelyn Campbell, a lecturer in health studies at Inverness College UHI, spent eight weeks in Malawi teaching student nurses and working

in the local hospital and around the community. Donations she took out with her helped to re-build a school and provide toilets in the villages. Evelyn and others from around the UHI network recently took part in a sponsored walk from UHI Executive Office to HTC to raise more funds for the project.
