Plans ... to Give You Hope and a Future



I am not long back from a weekend's bible teaching in Gardenstown where the local Church of Scotland folks were gathered in annual conference mode, but also gathered to give thanks to God for their newly refurbished church premises. As part of the very tasteful refurbishment, two new banners were mounted on the pulpit wall of the church with the words from Jeremiah 29:11 prominently displayed: 'I know the plans I have for you ... plans to give you hope and a future,' words which directed the theme of the teaching over the weekend on 'Promises of Renewal' from Jeremiah chapters 29-31.

What an encouragement it was to hear the Session Clerk outline the process that had brought them to engage in this refurbishment programme, and that had made the words of the above verse so very real and relevant to them. At a

time when the congregation was very unsure about the way ahead, the buildings were seriously damaged by burst pipes during one of our recent severe winters, with the result that the congregation was forced into doing something about their buildings. What hit them thet winter an anomaly the second was forced in the second s

that winter as an apparent tragedy, soon, under God, became a 'door of hope' for them, and an avenue to their realising as a congregation that the Lord still had work for them to do. He had plans for them; plans for their future; plans that gave hope for their future.



Over the weekend it seemed to me that what has happened in that congregation could be a parable of God's purposes for the rest of the church in our nation, across the denominations, in these days. I came away from the weekend more convinced than ever that God still has plans for his church throughout Scotland, and, as in Jeremiah's day, these are 'plans to prosper you and not to harm you, plans to give you hope and a future.' There may still be

difficult days ahead for the churches, but the church has a future, the church has hope. The future is bright because God has his plans which none can thwart. The apparent tragedies that hit us from time to time can be turned by the hand of God to our greatest benefit. The ultimate example of that is, of course, what happened on the Cross. At first, it seemed to be the high point of Satan's triumph; his hour! But the words of Christ on the cross - 'It is finished!' were not words of failure and defeat, but rather of the greatest triumph this world has ever known – words that remind us that Love has conquered all!

God still works like that. Satan always oversteps the mark and the love of Christ triumphs! Hold the faith! Pray, work and witness into God's future!

Celebrations to mark the installation of HRH The Princess Royal as the first Chancellor of the University will take place on 7th June in Inverness Cathedral. The event will include the presentation of Ensigns Armorial to the University and the award of Honorary Fellowships of the University to Colin MacKay CBE, former Chair of the Board of Governors , and Professor Robert Cormack FRSA FRSE. Professor Cormack served as Principal of UHI

Millennium Institute, the predecessor to the university, from 2001 to 2009. Under his leadership UHI achieved taught degree awarding powers in 2008 and reached the final stages in the process for university title. The ceremony will be followed by an academic procession to the University's Executive Office at Ness Walk.
