Principal's Letter



In our previous newsletter I wrote about the important place that the Fatherhood of God has come to have in my own thinking in recent times. Meantime, my thoughts have continued to focus much on this whole area of the Scripture's teaching, not least in preparation for a Teaching Weekend on the theme in Skye, and also for an evening class in Inverness.



These events are now past, but I continue to explore the wonderful riches of the Scriptures on our relationship with God, which is so often described in terms of a Father-son relationship. Two texts that are very significant in helping us to understand that relationship more fully are Matthew 3:17 (and its parallels in the other Gospels), and John 14:31. Taken together, these texts highlight the fact that the Lord's Father-son relationship with us is intended to be one of mutual love.



In Matthew 3:17, a voice from heaven – surely that of the Father? – was heard to say: 'This is my Son, whom I love; with him I am well pleased.' Of course, we are not surprised to hear that the eternal Son of God is the 'Beloved' of the Father, for 'God is love' and the three Persons of the blessed and glorious Trinity have eternally experienced fullness of love in the inner relationships of the Trinity. But, here, the man Christ Jesus is 'Son of God' in other senses too. He stands in the waters of baptism as the new Adam, head of God's new humanity and royal head of his new creation. He takes his place there also as the fulfilment of all that Israel was intended to be as Son of God (Exodus 4:22), and also as the Messianic King (see 2 Samuel 7:14).







In these roles the Father acknowledges Jesus as 'my Son.' But in each of these roles, Jesus Christ is representative of all his people, of all who will belong to the new Israel of God, to the new humanity and to the new creation. So, what all Christians hear in the Father's voice at the Jordan is a wonderful acknowledgement on the part of the Father that we are his children! Along with that, there is the additional assurance that we are loved by him, every bit as much as Jesus is! And, even more, 'in Christ' the Father is 'well pleased' with each of us. What dignity that gives to each Christian! What encouragement! Is this the way you think of God as Father? One who is not ashamed to acknowledge you as his child; One who expresses his love for you so clearly, as well as his delight and pleasure in you.

The other side of this relationship is seen in John 14:31, a wonderful little verse in which Jesus says: 'the world must learn that I love the Father ...' Here we see what the true human response to the heavenly Father is to be. We are to respond to his love with love - love which shows itself, as did that of Jesus, in loving obedience to the Father. May we ever grow in our knowledge and experience of these mutual bonds of eternal covenant love.

As we all know, the first time we meet someone lasting impressions are made. These first impressions can lead us to make assumptions about one another, assumptions that may or may not be true. I struggle with the first meetings largely because I am a shy person. So my reaction is either to say too much or too little. I was, or so I thought, the most unlikely candidate to be 'called' (and it had to be by God!) to study the scriptures in a formal setting. At the time I was very involved at various levels in our local church. I had one primary school child and one toddler. Life was pretty hectic.

Hector Kinnen, a trainee lay reader, came to our church on placement. He made a huge impact on many through the preaching of the Word and many lives were changed. Until then I had never heard of HTC (or 'Highland Theological Institute' as it then was, and based in Moray College).

For a time I tried to ignore the deep stirrings in my own heart to actually contact the College myself and find out more. I had a mountain of reasons not to, but as many students - both past and present - have found, when the Lord has something specific for us he doesn't let go until we respond! I made the phone call in fear and trembling..! Noel Due, the tutor who headed up the Access Course at that time, wasn't available. 'Great, off the hook', or so I thought! A sign I wasn't meant to do this course at all. But Noel called back later the same day. I knew as soon as he began to explain about the course that it was something I had to do. Fearful or not, God was in it.

I began my studies by Open Learning. I was able to meet with the other students and my tutor occasionally, which was really helpful and very encouraging. It wasn't long before it was made clear to both me and my husband that the Lord wanted me to commit to studying the course full-time. After a lot of juggling and persuading family that it was the right thing, my studies began full-time.

The Access Course was for me an amazing journey of faith and, having spoken to other students, many found it to be so. I didn't find it easy. Indeed, my tutors would testify to my absolute consuming fear of exam situations and on a couple of occasions I had to be prayed and guided back into the class room!

I completed the Access Course and went on to full-time BA study! Again there were occasions when my tutors had to pray me back into the exam room!! In both Access and the BA, the course work was excellent; clearly presented and easy to follow. The content, though hard for me at times, I found deeply challenging but very enlightening. The tutor support and support from other students was very often what

kept me going when I was struggling. They went the extra mile. Being prayed with and prayed for makes a world of difference.

HTC has been one of the most challenging places and experiences in my life but it has also been one of the most rewarding. I can honestly say that it has been a privilege for me to study here. And the blessings continue for me... The Lord has recently opened up the way for me to work part-time here. I help in Reception, which is great for meeting and encouraging people along the way, and I also give tutorial support to the Access students, again a great privilege for me.

At its most recent meeting, the Board was delighted to hear that Mr R Murray McCheyne, a solicitor



practising in Inverness, had accepted the invitation to be the new Vice Chair. We are delighted with this appointment and wish Murray well in his new role within the Board. It seems quite fitting that in the Highlands of Scotland, where the name Robert Murray McCheyne is still revered, we should find ourselves with his namesake on our Board of Governors! Murray, as he prefers to be called, is in fact descended from a brother of the 19th century Scottish divine, McCheyne, whose *Memoirs and Remains* and other books of sermons are still avidly read by many Christians.

Jamie at OMF Youth Conference

Jamie Grant, Vice Principal, gave the Bible readings at the OMF Youth Conference held at Lendrick Muir in January. The theme of the event was 'Ready, Steady, Grow' so Jamie's talks – based on the Psalms – addressed the spiritual growth of the individual, growth as a community of God's people and the expansion of the Gospel-community to include people from 'every tribe and tongue and nation'. The participants at the conference were also able to hear fascinating presentations about OMF's work in Cambodia, Japan, Thailand and amongst 'third culture kids' (missionary kids, in old money!). Jamie enjoyed engaging with this group of students and young graduates (including some from the Highlands)

who are passionate about the spread of the message of God's grace to people who have not yet heard about Jesus. The OMF Scotland Team and many other missions agencies do a great job of encouraging a missions vision in the Scottish churches.



Missions reps frequently visit the college and our students were encouraged by the

recent visit of the Scottish Missions Tour where reps from Mission Africa, CEF, WEC, Interserve and OMF presented opportunities for both long and short term service in various parts of the world. As part of that event, David Miller from International Christian College in Glasgow gave an excellent talk on cross-cultural issues. We are grateful to this group for continuing to including HTC in its tour of the Scottish Universities. National and world mission is an important part of the vision of HTC and we seek to encourage a missional attitude amongst our students wherever they might end up serving the Lord.

Visit of Rev Dr Noel Due

As indicated in our previous Newsletter, we are looking forward to a visit in May from the Rev Dr Noel Due, one of our former colleagues on staff here at HTC, who has been senior pastor of Coromandel Valley Baptist Church in South Australia since he moved on from the College in the summer of 2004. Congratulations to...

Ros Clarke, PhD student, who has won one of four inaugural bursaries from the Erasmus Fund (these bursaries are awarded to PhD students from the UK who are working in biblical studies);

Jonathan MacKenzie, PhD student, who won the 'Best Student Presentation' award at the UHI Postgraduate Conference in Thurso;

Cliff Boone, who successfully defended his thesis on 'Puritan Evangelism: Preaching for Conversion in mid-seventeenth century English Puritanism as seen in the works of John Flavel'. Cliff's completion brings to an end HTC's association with the University of Wales, Lampeter, for the supervision of PhD students;

Ordination and Induction of Dr Rob Barlow

The ordination and induction of Dr Rob Barlow took place in The Round Church, Bowmore, Islay on 28th January. The Round Church is one of the churches in the linked parishes of Kilarrow and Kildalton & Oa in the Presbytery of Argyll. We wish him every blessing in his ministry there. Rob's route into parish ministry has not been altogether straightforward, as he describes below:



I was accepted for training as an auxiliary minister in the Church of Scotland back in 2003. I needed to sit a prescribed set of theology modules

with a major Scottish secular university. Initially my studies progressed well but I soon noticed that some fellow students struggled with the modules. I became concerned that training ministers, readers and others in theology at secular universities, where many (but not all) of the lecturers discount much of the substance of the Bible, was bound to cause problems for some students.

My training progressed well and I asked to transfer to training for full-time ministry at the beginning of 2008. HTC had, by this time, been approved as a training centre for the Church of Scotland so I opted to transfer to HTC to complete my studies.

I had to complete by the end of 2009 if I was to meet the age limits specified by the Church of Scotland.

In order to fit everything in it was necessary for HTC to spend some considerable effort looking at possible modules versus my previous studies. Fortunately a study route was found and I was able to start at Easter 2008.

I completed successfully my degree studies last summer and I have to say that the period I have spent at HTC has been just brilliant. There is a serious intellectual rigour to the studies but this is always liberally sprinkled with faith. To be able to study Paul, for example, from the angle of faith rather than from a secular viewpoint has been inspiring. The opportunity to work with other students from different churches and backgrounds has also been very rewarding.

I am so pleased to have had the opportunity to study theology in a faith-based college and it is reassuring to know that HTC and its staff are there so that I can continue to benefit from the wealth of knowledge and experience they have. I commend students to consider HTC as a place to study theology.

Glencalvie Challenge

The Glencalvie Challenge is a charity fundraising event for walkers, runners or bikers over seventeen and a half miles of estate roads through mountainous terrain from Black Bridge in Ross-shire to Glencalvie Lodge in Sutherland. It is organised by the Rotary Club of Inverness-Culloden and teams are encouraged to take part to raise funds for their own chosen charities. Last summer a team of intrepid walkers from HTC raised funds to support both HTC and Dumisani Theological Institute in King William's Town, South Africa. Like HTC, Dumisani Theological Institute depends on donations from

churches and individual supporters. The HTC team, four students and five staff, raised sponsorship money of £1317. Ian Kinghorn, president of Inverness-Culloden branch of the Rotary Club, visited HTC in January to present the cheque. Alistair Wilson, principal of Dumisani, was home in Scotland over the Christmas/New Year period and was delighted to be present to accept a cheque for £700 towards the work in South Africa. At the beginning of December, Alistair and his wife, Jenny, visited the college, when Alistair led us in worship, speaking from the Book of Jonah. During a shared lunch he and Jenny then went on to share with us something of the work of the Dumisani Theological Institute and their wider Sunday School training programmes.

Access Course in Christian Theology

The Access Course has two main functions: 1) as an entry course before embarking on the BA programme, and 2) as a stand-alone course for anyone who wants to study the Christian faith but not at degree-level. Many have studied Access just for their own interest, without the intention of progressing to further theological studies.

- For anyone who wants to study the Christian faith. Suitable for those new to the faith and those who are long-established in the faith.
- No formal qualifications are required for entrance onto the course. Particularly suitable for those
 wishing to study the Christian faith but who do not have the necessary qualifications for entry to
 HTC's BA Theological Studies degree. Other institutions may also recognise this course as an
 appropriate entry qualification to degree level courses in theology or other disciplines.
- Age is no barrier previous Access students have included school-leavers, pensioners, and all ages in between.
- Great for school-leavers who wish to take a year out before going to university.
- Work at your own pace. Complete the whole course successfully within two years to gain the 'Certificate of Access in Christian Theology' (you will then be eligible to apply for our BA in Theological Studies degree, if you wish) or if you take more than two years you will gain the 'Certificate of Completion'.
- Available by full-time and open learning modes. For those studying by open learning, a pack of materials clearly details how to proceed through the course. The reading for each unit is carefully set out, and students will be guided through a set of activities and instructed when to return written work to their tutor. Personal tutorial support is available to all students, and there is the opportunity to meet with other students at regular Conference Days.
- Six modules, each comprising 15 units. Each unit takes about 4 hours to complete.
- You don't have to study all the modules. If you want, you can choose individual module(s) without committing to studying the whole Access Course.
- Registered with ILA Scotland. If you are eligible for ILA funding you could use it to pay for Access modules. To find out more about the ILA scheme see <u>www.ilascotland.org.uk</u> or telephone 0808 100 1090.


