A Time to Weep ... A Time to Dance.....















As Koheleth famously said (Ecclesiastes 3:1): 'There is a time for everything, and a season for every activity under heaven ...' On occasions it is 'a time to weep,' at others 'a time to dance' (v 4).' As, we look back over the past six months of College life, there is so much about which to 'dance' and to give thanks to God; so much to encourage and enthuse about, and you can read of these good stories inside — stories of the granting of University Title to UHI; of the licensing and ordination of former students; of academic successes; of books being written; testimonies being given; and, the call of God coming to individuals and families. We rejoice with those who rejoice.

But, I am also conscious that, as I write, for many of you, as for some of our students, this is 'a time to weep,' and, in the body of Christ we cannot but weep with those who weep. Our Saviour was, of course, a man who knew what it was to weep floods of tears with, and over, those whom he loved and who reciprocated that love. (John 11:35,38). But he also knew the deep, heart-wrenching pain of weeping over those whom he loved with all his heart but who rejected his love. We see this, for example, in Luke 19:41: 'As he approached Jerusalem and saw the city, he wept over it and said, "If you, even you, had only known on this day what would bring you peace — but now it is hidden from your eyes. The days will come upon you when your enemies.... will not leave one stone on another, because you did not recognise the time of God's coming to you".'

Jesus' heart was broken because of the ignorance and blindness of the people of Jerusalem: that society that should have known better; that society that had had ever opportunity of grace. Jesus wept over Jerusalem, because its people could not see or understand the way of peace, salvation, wholeness and completeness that a whole line of Old Testament prophets, and now the greatest Prophet of all as well as the Incarnate Word, had brought to them. Jesus wept because they 'did not recognise the time of God's coming' to them; but he wept too because of what they were going to miss out on; and he wept because of what their chosen route would bring them. Yes, Jesus saw the judgement and destruction of Jerusalem coming, and he spoke about it out of a broken heart and through tear-stained eyes — is there any other

way to speak of coming judgement?

And what did Jesus do? He kept on loving them, serving them, and teaching them the truth with boldness and unrivalled authority, until Jerusalem threw him out; until they excommunicated him, transfixing him to the cross 'outside the city wall.' Meanwhile, '... [Jesus] did not retaliate ... he made no threats. Instead, he entrusted himself to him who judges justly' (1 Peter 2:23). What an example!

In these days, those of us who find ourselves in the company of the weeping prophets (e.g., Jer 9:1), and in the company of a weeping Saviour, heart-broken at the condition of the church we love and serve, would do well to develop the patience of the prophets (see James 5:10). It is natural to be impatient for God to act. Let us, instead, be spiritual, and patient, and let God do the judging in his time. And, meantime, perhaps he will even surprise us with the blessings of a new dawn! Should that really be such a surprise? 'Rejoicing comes in the morning' (Psalm 30:5); 'Blessed are those who mourn for they shall be comforted' (Matt 5:4). For Jesus there was the 'joy' of resurrection, glory and Pentecost. Can it be any different for the weeping, broken Body of Christ today?

University Title for UHI

The 2nd of February was an historic day for Highland Theological College UHI as *UHI Millennium Institute* became the *University of the Highlands and Islands (UHI)*. The achievement of university title by UHI is the culmination of years of work by many people and the realisation of a long-time ambition for the region to have its own university to support economic development and to help sustain rural and island communities.

UHI comprises thirteen colleges, specialist institutions and research centres spread across



the Highlands and Islands of Scotland, an area twice the size of Wales. It uses information technologies to link together students and staff to bring access to higher education to dispersed communities.

Highland Theological College UHI was founded in 1994, at the early stages of the 'UHI Project' by a group of ministers and businessmen who had the vision that a theological college would be part of the proposed

university. Amongst that group were the Reverend Andrew McGowan, the Reverend Hector Morrison and the Reverend Alexander Murray. HTC grew up at the same time as the UHI Project so has been part of UHI almost from its start. HTC's staff have been heavily involved in the development of curriculum and also academic quality assurance and standards in UHI over the years and have contributed significantly to the success of UHI and its progress towards university title.

One of the smallest colleges in the UHI network, HTC has one of the highest proportions of research activity in UHI and its staff and students are regularly invited to speak at national and international conferences. The reputation of HTC has drawn students from all over the world, putting Dingwall clearly on the world map. The current cohort includes students from the USA, Japan, New Zealand and Belarus.

There was media coverage over the whole Highlands and Islands area in February to mark the special occasion and a 'celebration day' is planned for the 25th of August. Special events will take place including the formal presentation of the robes to the Vice-Chancellor and the presentation of the new mace – a symbol of university authority – by our sponsor universities: The University of Aberdeen, The University of Edinburgh and The University of Strathclyde.

One thing that I think it is important for our supporters to realise is that the staff of each of the colleges within UHI continue to be employed, paid and under the authority of their own college and are not paid by the university. This autonomy, of course, is one of the attractions of UHI for HTC as we remain in complete control of our staffing. However, HTC salaries are very modest compared to that paid by other colleges in UHI, and we will always be reliant on support from the Lord's people to enable us to continue to operate. This is all the more the case now as we move into a three year period of severe cuts in university funding, as in many other areas of public life.

Having a university in the Highlands and Islands will bring great opportunities for the area – educational, economic and socio-cultural. It is a very exciting time for UHI and we are privileged to be part of it. It is our hope and prayer that HTC's involvement in UHI will also help to bring spiritual and moral renewal to the area, and beyond.

The new UHI logo was unveiled on 2nd February. The graphic represents the hills, seas and lochs of the area. Each of the partner institutions making up the UHI network has designed a new logo. Each logo is unique,


