# The Lord Reigns

These are difficult days for the church in Scotland as the church, across all its denominations, seems to stagger from one crisis to another. The voice of secular humanism roars ever more loudly from the outside as it grows in confidence, belligerence and intolerance; while, inside, the church is torn apart, on the one hand, by pride, arrogance, self-righteousness and lack of love, and, on the other hand, by scandals over moral failures, and arrogant disregard for the clear teaching of the word of God. Add to that the pressing economic crisis, an ageing and continually declining church membership, and the countless vacancies and one might wonder what future the church can possibly have.

At such a time we need to do what the psalmist does in Psalm 93. We need to lift our eyes from the storms that buffet us and have our focus firmly set once again, and day by day, on the One who sits where he has always been, on the throne of the universe: 'The Lord reigns, he is robed in majesty; the Lord is robed in majesty and is armed with strength.' That reality is not one that the secular humanist can see. Indeed, he would mock at such a suggestion. But, sadly, is it any more of a reality to those of us in the Christian church? Only the eye of faith can see and grasp and lay hold of such a reality – faith founded on the truth of God's self-revelation in his word. And this is what faith does see – a regnant Christ; a triumphant Christ; the Lamb of God on the throne of the universe! In the midst of the storm let us not take our eyes off Christ, for it is then that we begin to flounder, as Peter discovered (Matt 14:30)!

In verses 3-4 of the psalm, the author recognises the times through which he has been living as stormy times; times of opposition to God and his cause; times of vocal, even strident opposition (v 3): 'The seas have lifted up, O Lord, the seas have lifted up their voice; the seas have lifted up their pounding waves.' He speaks of the 'thunder of the great waters' and 'the breakers of the sea', and we

can almost imagine the storms crashing over his life and over the life of the people of God. Yet, with his eyes fixed on the throne and the One enthroned upon it, he is able to say with confidence (v 4): 'Mightier than the thunder ... mightier than the breakers – the Lord on high is mighty!'

In the midst of all the present disarray in the church, we need to remember on a daily basis that the Lord is King. He is in control, as he has always been. He knows what he is doing, and, even more than that, through the storms, and even using the storms, he is actually forwarding his purposes in this world – purposes of grace and salvation! Can we not trust him for that? And, meanwhile (v 5), let us keep his statutes which 'stand firm'; and let us adorn his house with 'holiness'.

# Scottish Bulletin of Evangelical Theology

We are excited to announce a new association with the Scottish Evangelical Theology Society (SETS) for the production and distribution of the society's biannual journal Scottish Bulletin of Evangelical Theology (SBET). SETS began life as the Scottish equivalent of the Tyndale Fellowship. The aims of the society are to promote within Scotland the advance of evangelical theology in the biblical, doctrinal, historical and



practical fields; to encourage original research in these fields; and to help foster the formation of evangelical perspectives on issues of moment in ecclesiastical and national life. The *Bulletin* is a significant part of the work of SETS and dovetails very well with the academic output of HTC. The new working relationship between SETS and HTC is a hugely exciting step forward for both the society and the College and is a good example of the increasing levels of

## Ministry, OLM and Readership Training

HTC trains students of many denominations (and none) and is specifically recognised as a training establishment for Readership and Ministry candidates for the Associated Presbyterian Church, Church of Scotland and United Free Church



of Scotland. We also train students for Ordained Local Ministry (OLM) in the Church of Scotland. As a general guide, Readership candidates



are required to complete the Certificate in Higher Education (equivalent to the first year of the BA degree), OLM candidates are required to complete the Diploma in Higher Education (equivalent to the first two years of the BA degree) and Ministry candidates are required to complete



the BA degree. *Interested students should check specific requirements with their denomination.* Further advice can be obtained from the HTC Registry Officer.

#### MTh

This year's MTh programme has been running successfully. Modules are taught as weeklong intensive sessions followed by time to work on essays and class sizes allow for lots of discussion and exchange of ideas. This structure is well suited to the MTh being used as a CPD opportunity for those already in full-time ministry. The programme team includes Dr Jason Maston, Dr Jamie Grant, Dr Innes Visagie, Dr Nick Needham, Professor Andrew McGowan, Professor Paul Helm, Professor Gerald Bray, Rev Dominic Smart and Dr Iain MacRitchie. ## Access to Christian Theology

## 20 Amazing Years

Twenty years ago this coming February two Church of Scotland ministers, Andrew McGowan and Hector Morrison, were at a meeting in Elgin that changed the course of their lives. They met with Dr Robert Chalmers, principal of Moray College in Elgin and also chair of the University of the Highlands and Islands Project, to explore how a proposed theological college might become part of a future university of the Highlands and Islands. At that time such a theological college was little more than a vision or dream that Andrew had shared with some churchmen in the North of Scotland in the

previous year or so. At the meeting Dr Chalmers informed them that there was a brief 'window of opportunity' for access that would soon close. He challenged them to start the college in premises rented from Moray College that August! When they said, 'That's impossible! How can you start a college in a few months' time with no courses, no library, no students, no staff and no money?', his response was, 'I thought you were men of faith!' Within six months Highland Theological Institute (as it was then called) had begun in Elgin, and the rest, as they say, is history!

It has been a phenomenal journey, full of ups and downs. Throughout 2014 we hope to hold some events to celebrate our anniversary, looking back over some of the amazing experiences of the past 20 years and looking forward to the plans God has for us over the coming years. We hope to publish our planned programme of events in the next Newsletter and on our website. We warmly invite you to attend any or all of those events so that you can join us in thanking God for HTC and for all the students who have been, and will yet be, trained here.
