Who Cares about Theological Education?

God does, as is evident
from both bible and
Christian history. From
the very beginning of his
covenant relationship with
Israel God instituted a teaching
priesthood (Mal 2:6-7), followed by

schools of the prophets (2 Kings 2:7) and wisdom 'schools' (Jer 18:18). In the New Testament, Jesus had his early disciples undergo an intense

three year training period which involved significant periods of sustained teaching, a pattern that was followed in measure by the apostle Paul, not least at Ephesus (Acts 19). And beyond the biblical era, as Rev Dr Sinclair Ferguson reminds us: 'The whole of Christian history cries out to us to teach us that wherever there is a genuine Christian spirituality, then that genuine Christian spirituality is drawn as a magnet to theological instruction and education.'

At a time when a number of what were once the theological faculties of Scotland's ancient universities are morphing into departments of



Religious Studies, or less, and when the general level of bible knowledge and of theological awareness in the church itself, let alone in society at large, has perhaps never been so low for centuries, is it not time for our churches to wake up to the crying need to support sound theological education?

At HTC we would love to create at least a couple of professorial Chairs, in the first instance in Theology and Biblical Studies, to be filled by individuals who will have the time and space to devote themselves to being at the cutting edge of theological reflection, discourse and writing from a reformed, evangelical perspective at the same time as being rooted in a deep love of God, reverence for his word and love and compassion for his creation and for the lost. We anticipate that these individuals, along with our present staff, will then gather around them some of the brightest Christian minds of this generation in Scotland, to sharpen them and prepare them to be the Christian teachers, preachers and leaders of the next generation both here in Scotland and to the ends of the earth.

But all of that needs investment on the part of those to whom the Lord has given the means and who have caught the vision that the knowledge of God must be given priority, that theology is indeed the queen of the sciences, and that theological education needs to become an absolute priority for us as it has always been for the Lord himself. Is the Lord calling you to be one of those who can enable this to happen in a new and significant way? If so, we would love to hear from you.

But HTC continues to be involved in theological education at more grassroots levels too. One of the most thrilling aspects of this past academic session for myself has been to see the hunger among the general Christian public from across a wide breadth of denominations as they came together weekly for classes I taught on Old Testament Overview – about an hour of solid bible teaching each week, interspersed with time for questions and answers. This is an aspect of the work that we want to continue as staff time allows – see later in this Newsletter for details for the coming semester.

One exciting new venture that we are launching in the autumn in collaboration with a number of local churches is an Apprenticeship Programme in which HTC will provide the formal theological education one or two days a week for apprentices who will serve for the rest of the week in local congregations. This Newsletter contains more information. It is our prayerful hope that as this work develops more and more congregations will be drawn into the programme and that we will see a new generation of Christian leaders beginning to emerge.

And this autumn HTC spreads its wings and moves into Glasgow too, to fill part of the gap for evangelical theological education left by the demise of International Christian College. Over the page you'll see more about this exciting initiative.

As I prepared to write this piece, I took time to listen once again to Rev Dr Sinclair Ferguson's address given on the occasion of the commissioning of Andrew McGowan and myself to the work of the college back in 1994. I would encourage any who feel stirred in their hearts by the Spirit of God as they read this to take the time to prayerfully listen to that address in which Sinclair shows clearly that throughout the whole history of the church great movements of renewal, revival and reformation have usually been preceded or accompanied by a significant investment in intensive theological education. Is the Lord calling you to invest your life in this? Or your means? Or your prayer time or other talents? If so we would love to hear from you.

Glasgow, here we come!



The countdown is on! In our previous two Newsletters we have intimated our hope for establishing a teaching facility in the Central Belt of Scotland. As this Newsletter goes to print, we are in the process of formalising an agreement with our Glasgow partner so that we can open classrooms to students from September 2015. This is an initial step towards providing what we hope will, in due time, progress towards the establishment of an HTC campus in Glasgow.

HTC students can use a variety of study modes. Some attend classes in the Dingwall campus; others use their computer at home to watch and listen to the lecture while it's taking place – they can even speak to their lecturer and classmates to ask questions etc as though they were in the classroom; those who are unavailable at the time of the lecture can view recordings at a time that suits them; or they can use a combination of methods appropriate to their individual circumstances. This tremendous flexibility allows many students to study through HTC who would otherwise find it difficult to study at a traditional university.

Notwithstanding the flexibility already offered to students, demand for provision by HTC to applicants in the Central Belt has been increasing yet

some have indicated that distance-learning is unsuitable for their needs. To accommodate their preference for class-room based learning we have come to an arrangement with the United Free Church of Scotland to use part of their facilities at their head office in the centre of Glasgow to set up HTC classrooms. The venue is conveniently located for train, underground and bus travel and will comprise classrooms, fully equipped with high quality video-conferencing equipment, and a small library area.

This provision at Newton Place, Glasgow, is offered to Central Belt students as an enhancement to the excellent distance-learning service already offered and it is anticipated to be suitable for many but not all students. Some

students, including those with limited mobility, will still benefit from the convenience of studying at home.

This is a huge development for HTC. We are confident that God is leading us forward and we are excited about embarking on this new adventure with Him. We are very grateful to the Rev. John Fulton, General Secretary, and the Trustees of the United Free Church of Scotland for partnering with us to make this project possible and for their

tremendous encouragement and excitement at being part of this work.

Be one of the first to use our new Glasgow classrooms! Applications being taken <u>now</u> for students to commence BA (Hons) Theological Studies degree-level study from September 2015.

HTC students benefit from the **university fees** rate which is **considerably lower than that of most independent bible or theological colleges**.

Most Scottish-resident students are **entitled to fee payment by SAAS** (the <u>Students Awards Agency for Scotland</u>) who can also offer student loans and other support. Depending on individual circumstances, 'Individual Learning Accounts' may also be available for part-time study.

HTC **scholarships** are available for other UK (non-Scottish-resident) students.

Students benefit from Scholarships

Theological study is important for the future of the church. We need church leaders committed to God, grounded in a sound understanding of his Word and equipped to 'go into all the world and proclaim the gospel to the whole creation' (Mark 16:15). For most students, however, good theological study is expensive and costs can be prohibitive to some.

For many years the Trustees of HTC have worked hard to establish scholarships. We are delighted to have received donations to HTC specifically for this purpose and through this generosity are now able to offer scholarships for theological study at undergraduate and postgraduate level. These scholarships were introduced only a few months ago and have already benefited some students.

At undergraduate level, most Scottish students receive funding towards the cost of their fees. Fees for other UK students outside Scotland are very high yet students are still attracted to HTC because of the evangelical ethos and flexible study arrangements. Scholarships are available to support such 'RUK' students, either for full-time or part-time study whether they opt to attend the Dingwall campus or take their classes by distance-learning.

At postgraduate level, ministers and pastors are being offered scholarships to enable them to further their studies through the Master of Theology programme, benefiting not only themselves but their congregations too. Scholarships are also available for PhD students from outwith the EU who come across to Scotland to study at the

Dingwall campus.

Scholarships can make all the difference for a student, even the difference between being able to follow a call into ministry or not, relieving the distraction of financial pressure and allowing them to focus on their studies.

Maybe you remember your



student days and are grateful that you received a grant or scholarship to help with your expenses. If you would like to help a theology student and can contribute in some way towards the cost of their training we would be pleased to hear from you. One way could be to leave a gift in your will.

New Ministry Apprenticeship Programme

Apprenticeship schemes are widely used in lots of professions. The young apprentice learns his or her trade from the experienced worker. In a church setting, apprenticeship schemes provide an opportunity for 'trying out' whether full-time gospel ministry is right for the apprentice or can be a first step into full-time gospel ministry. We just have to read Paul's letters to Timothy for an example of early church apprenticeship.

Church apprenticeships are commonly 1 or 2 year placements where someone is engaged in gospel ministry and can experience something of the sort of Christian work they feel God is calling them into. The apprentice learns as they serve, and the congregation nurtures and supports them along the way while they are trained and mentored by the pastor.

HTC has teamed up with a number of local bible-teaching churches to offer a new Ministry Apprenticeship Programme to people investigating Christian work. The programme has four components: leadership, study, ministry and practical tasks, with much of the study element being offered through HTC.

Who is it for? Can I be an apprentice? Do you feel called to some kind of Christian work? Are you ready to work hard as you learn the ropes? Do you have a servant heart? Apprentices can be school-leavers, graduates, people taking a 'gap year', early retirees, or anyone looking for a career change.

What will I get out of it? As an apprentice, you'll become fully involved in the life and witness of a congregation. You'll be mentored by an experienced minister and nurtured by the congregation as you receive training in four main areas (leadership, study, ministry and practical tasks). At the end of your apprenticeship you'll have a good understanding of ministry in that local context and be well-equipped to apply for church-related employment or even to progress to training for pastoral ministry or other forms of Christian service.

Is it expensive? The congregation will make a contribution towards the cost of your training and we can give some advice about applying for grants too. The more support you can raise from friends, family and grants the less you will need to contribute towards your training and expenses. Specific costs will depend on the local situation.
