Changes in senior management positions

Professor **Crichton Lang**, Interim Principal and Vice-Chancellor of the University of the Highlands and Islands, retires at the end of the year having served with UHI (and UHI Millennium Institute) for more than 14 years. We thank Crichton for his service to UHI and wish him well in his retirement.

The new Principal and Vice-Chancellor of UHI will be Professor **Todd Walker**. Professor Walker joins UHI from the University of New England, which has multiple campuses in the state of New South Wales, Australia. He will take up his appointment on 1 February 2021 which will be ten years to the day since UHI officially gained university status.

In the intervening period, Professor **Neil Simco** will take on the role of Acting Principal and Vice-Chancellor following Professor Lang's retirement until Professor Walker takes up his new appointment.

Fiona Larg MBE, Chief Operating Officer and Secretary of UHI, has also intimated her intention to retire at the end of April.



Blended learning

HTC has years of experience delivering lectures online (and we're really good at it 👌 😳) so despite all the restrictions brought about by coronavirus we've made maximum use of the amazing technology we have available to continue educating and training students to serve in a wide variety of ministries. There's been the odd hiccup but we've tried to keep disruption to a minimum and I'm sure the students will agree that, under the circumstances, classes have gone very smoothly. Obviously meeting 'virtually' by videoconferencing isn't the same as being together on-campus but the opportunities to chat to one another online during and after classes, joining for 'virtual' coffee breaks, having regular online worship and prayer meetings, and various social events organised by the students themselves, have all helped bind the Community of Faith and Scholarship together.

Across the university sector, UHI has led the way in 'blended learning' with a huge technology network shared across the whole university partnership. The UHI 'virtual learning environment' has always been heavily used but with more online classes across the partnership there has been a huge increase in the number of student log-ins, keeping the IT team on their toes. Well done and thank you to all our techy people for keeping things running smoothly and to our students for having to cope with so much screen-time.

What does 'blended learning' mean for our students?

Video-conference classes are 'live'
Students can engage with the lecturers and
fellow students as part of the class

 Recordings, which include the discussions taking place in class, are available for students who cannot attend classes at the 'live' time (for example those who work during the week and study in the evenings or weekends

 'Discussion boards' in the VLE (virtual learning environment) enable students to engage with one another outside of 'class time', for example for seminar preparation

 Lecturers organise occasional live evening tutorial sessions for students who are unable to access live classes during the day

This blended learning approach far surpasses the old methods used by some universities, where students watch videos of recorded lectures and cannot engage in dialogue with lecturers or classmates!

Historical handwritten book donated to library

HTC library has a wealth of special collections material. One exciting primary source is this handwritten book of some 28 sermons dating from the 18th century.

A fascinating piece of Scottish church history, the book was penned by Rev Thomas Simpson of Avoch, an ancestor of a gentleman whose wife generously donated the book to the college. The donor lives overseas; she and her family thought it best that it be returned to Scotland where it originated. We are honoured to be custodians of it in the HTC library.

The postscript reads: 'This first volume of sermons was begun at Avoch the 27th day of October 1760 years and finished the first day of October 1761 years by me Thomas Simpson minister of the Gospel at Avoch. Deo Juvante.'
